Note: Nominations were received for two members who are elected to or running for government office. Chapter bylaws Article VII Section 2 states "No person elected to or running for government office may hold any leadership position of any kind in Atlanta DSA." The chapter steering committee discussed whether this bylaws provision should apply to these delegate elections, with some chapter members arguing that it should apply, and others arguing it should not. Pending further guidance from the National organization, the Steering Committee is allowing the candidates in question to run for delegate, and encourages all members to think about this question when casting their ballot.

Candidate Statements

Sumter A (they/them)

I have attended three DSA conventions in the past. As a DSA member since 2017, in the wake of the first Bernie campaign, I have seen our organization experience growth and challenge alike. For the past two years I have served as a Democracy Commissioner, studying DSA chapters and other socialist parties across the world to draft a resolution package to rationalize DSA. If elected, I will ensure DSA strengthens our links with unions and popular progressive organizations and endorses a socialist candidate for president to defeat Donald Trump. We need a united front against fascism, and I will help DSA become a key part of it.

In short:

Labor Unions. Socialists in Office. A Rational, Effective, Mass Democratic Organization. Let's build a socialist party from the base we have built.

Kelsea B (they/them)

Hey comrades! My name is Kelsea Bond, and I'm running for delegate on the Groundwork Slate. I have been a core Atlanta DSA organizer since 2020, served as the chapter Co-chair for nearly four years, sat on DSA's National Labor Commission, and am now a proudly DSA-endorsed candidate for Atlanta City Council.

I'm running for delegate for a third time because I believe that DSA is the vehicle we need to build a worker's party and win a socialist future. To do this, we need a strong, democratic national organization that is capable of responding to the political moment, fighting back against Trump's fascist regime, building a militant labor movement, and electing Democratic Socialist candidates at all levels of government. We are living in unprecedented times, but the socialist and labor movements are stronger than ever. We can win, but only if we take our responsibility seriously as the largest socialist organization this country has seen in decades. This means DSA needs principled national leadership willing to take a strong stance against the Far-right, and build the left-labor coalition we need to launch a nation-wide strike and run a viable socialist candidate for president in 2028.

Socialism is the best tool we have to defeat fascism. Working people are tired of the status quo and ready for something new. So let's meet the moment! Please vote for me and the rest of the Groundwork Slate to make sure that Atlanta sends a delegation ready to elect experienced national leadership, and build the labor and socialist movements we need to defeat fascism.

Kieran B (she/her)

When I first learned about the DSA, I was hesitant. Frankly, I was scared. But I'm tired; tired of being let down by a government that has never made space for people like me. In DSA, I found a spark of hope, and now more than ever, I'm committed to becoming part of the change I want to see.

Growing up in Missouri, I was often shunned for calling out the racism and sexism I saw in everyday life. I learned to shrink my voice, to give polite, politically acceptable answers. But I'm done with that. I'm no longer that girl. Today, I speak proudly, alongside my fellow workers, women, and comrades, for change not just in Atlanta, but across America.

If elected, I'll be a voice for women of color, a first generation American, and a working-class woman. As a member of Atlanta DSA leadership, I know my duty isn't just to represent myself, but to advocate for our entire chapter. That means uplifting marginalized communities, fighting for inclusion and equity, and demanding accountability from our government.

I'm running with the Rainbow Coalition Caucus because I believe in building a DSA where diversity isn't just welcomed, but it's foundational. I support their resolutions for fair representation through STV delegate elections and oppose efforts to censure Rep. Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez, a critical figure in our movement. Our caucus prioritizes services for those in need and political action on food insecurity, housing, and homelessness, crises too often ignored by mainstream media and establishment politics.

We cannot be a movement that turns away from struggle, we must run toward it. Not for them, not for us, but for everyone.

I'm done with silence. I'm done with half-assed promises from politicians we "support." I want action. And I know DSA is capable of building a better future for all of us.

Dan C (he/him)

The U.S. is at a cliff, risking a collapse into fascism. The only way we can pull ourselves away from that threat is through effective socialist organization, and it is on that understanding that I am nominating myself to be a delegate. I joined DSA in November and have since become part of the Membership Committee, secretary for Socialists in Office, and joined Kelsea Bond's campaign staff. Additionally, I am helping coordinate the in progress relaunch of the Cobb and DeKalb branches. Through this participation, I have been working from recruitment to mobilization to help get folks ingrained in the mass movement we are building.

This is what we need more of: effective recruitment and deployment. The DSA can rebuild the relationship with the working class the Democrats abandoned. DSA has shown it can run successful campaigns, with a socialist win even down here in Georgia, but it has of yet failed to make major inroads with minority communities and win back many of the white working class voters who abandoned the Democrats. We need intentional invitations to these communities through labor, electoral, and social outreach, utilizing our skills gained through other successful projects to bolster a mass movement. As part of this, the DSA needs to be democratic, openly engaging with its members and empowering them to participate in every level of the organization.

To achieve these goals, as a delegate, I will be supporting resolutions such as One Member One Vote which would empower non-delegates to have a voice in who is elected to DSA's National Leadership, so that DSA's direction is based on its actual membership and simply who has the most time to get involved. Also I will support R33, which will put priority on running a Left-Labor aligned candidate for the 2028 presidential election, a strategy that was successful in 2016 and leading up to 2020 in building DSA's membership.

If you want an effective and inclusive DSA, I hope to get your vote and work together.

Sydnei C-Q (he/him)

My name is Sydnei Church-Quijano and if elected delegate, I will bring a unique combination of dedication, leadership, and perspective that makes me well-suited to represent and support our chapter. I would like to build a supportive and inclusive environment where every member feels heard, respected, and empowered to contribute. I approach challenges with a positive mindset and a problem-solving attitude.

My number one goal is to see the chapter improve and grow.

In pursuit of that goal, I am involved in many things. I have been an electoral committee organizer since 2023, participating in the votes to endorse both Gabriel for State House and Kelsea for City Council. I am deeply involved in both campaigns. I am one of the most frequent canvassers, translated material to Spanish, and helped organize the canvassing operations for the Kelsea Campaign. I was on the ground during the Stop Cop City campaign and collected nearly 100 signatures for the petition to put it on the ballot. I have also recently helped organize marches and rallies and subsequently created the Collective Action subcommittee to organize even more!

If elected, I will go as an immigrant, representing other immigrants, who are underrepresented. Those who are right now feeling the brunt force of the Trump administration's repressive policies. I will go as someone deeply involved in this chapter's electoral work and understands what kind of changes are needed at the national level to help our chapter succeed even more. I will go as someone who has experienced this before, having been to the 2023 DSA National Convention. I want to see DSA do more to fight Trump, become more democratic, and bring socialism to the masses. That is what I will do if elected and I hope to earn your vote.

Mason C (he/him)

My name is Mason Cochran, and I am nominating myself to run for the position of delegate to attend the 2025 National DSA Convention as part of the Rainbow Coalition Caucus slate. I am a passionate and consistent organizer and have been since 2023 when I began working seriously with the Atlanta DSA and its membership committee.

As a delegate, I am primarily interested in ensuring the chapter sends a diverse group of working-class Atlantans to steer the organization in a manner that contributes positively to our movement.

I will support sensible resolutions such as a ban on AI for creative work within DSA, formalizing caucuses, or a resolution to make the organization more accessible for languages other than English. Additionally, I will support resolutions that contribute to the increasing influence of DSA within the United States broadly

by way of coalition-building, especially with more liberal groups. I fundamentally believe that the DSA is not presently in a position to tackle these issues alone. And if we are to become a true party for the working class, we need to be as accessible and appealing to the working class. This also includes measures to increase community engagement through mutual aid.

As an elected delegate, I will not support resolutions that hinder the work of our soon-to-be or currently elected members. This includes a resolution that would force people to run on a third-party/independent ballot line to receive an endorsement, or a resolution to censure AOC. Further, I won't support measures that make organizing more difficult in rural or red states. Such as resolutions advocating for an immediate dirty break with the Democratic Party. I think such measures are ineffective and will only work in deeply progressive areas, if at all.

In conclusion, I am incredibly excited for the potential to be sent as a delegate, and hope I have secured your vote.

Julia F (she/her)

My name is Julia Falgout. I am nominating myself to be a delegate in the Rainbow Coalition caucus at the 2025 National DSA Convention, where I will work to advocate for the inherent worth of all people. Though I am new to the Rainbow Coalition, in 2018 I was voted to be a young adult delegate for the United Methodist Global Young People's Convocation in South Africa. During GYPC, our young adult delegation wrote and debated on issues that continue to shape the future of our church. I collaborated with other young progressive voices to propel legislation that highlighted the voices of young people within our global body at our larger United Methodist General Conference body meeting.

As a delegate at the National Convention, I will vote to raise up the voices society has for too long deemed 'unworthy' and has turned their backs on. I fully support the Democracy for All proposal to Convention. I support the expansion of voting rights to non-citizens, formerly incarcerated people, and the currently incarcerated. My work in ministry with those who are marginalized by society continually reinforces this simple but powerful notion that all people have inherent worth and should be allowed to freely participate in our society. This should include but not be limited to expanding voting rights to the incarcerated, formerly incarcerated, non-citizen residents, and people under the age of 18.

I will not support any resolution that seeks to censure AOC from the party. Doing this would shatter the hope she brings to those who've lost hope, therefore causing insurmountable harm to this vibrant organization.

As we look towards what our future can look like in 2028 and beyond, I will work in Atlanta and beyond to create a broader coalition that represents the beautiful diversity of our society. I invite you to elect me to help us get to this more people-centric, diverse coalition.

Bianca G (she/her)

My name is Bianca (she//her), and I'm an organizer on our Political Education Committee, as well as a member on our Electoral Committee and the Kelsea Bond Campaign.

The DSA has had great success as a political and labor organization, and has great potential as a part of a mass movement to change this country, but it needs to develop more efficient and more resilient systems to do so. As a delegate, I will advocate for the resolutions that have worked on a local level. I will vote in favor of forming a national resource library and of standardizing branding. I will vote in favor of labor and electoral practices that have shown results, like running on the Democratic ballot line. I will not

support a resolution to censor AOC, as she has consistently voted progressively in office, and she has brought us new, driven members, and given us greater legitimacy. I will always vote in favor of being more democratic, and being more ambitious.

Our organization is growing, and now is the time to do more, like doing mutual aid, running more races, and supporting more unionization drives. I've been a member of ATLDSA since the fall of Roe in '22 and on electoral committee through Jan '25, during some big moments of our chapter's electoral work, including the SCC campaign, decriminalizing abortion in Dekalb, and Gabriel's victory. I've been canvassing, signature-collecting, phonebanking, and building community with DSA for 3 years. But I was radicalized long ago! Before I had the words of socialism, I knew a better world was possible when my dad took me to anti-Iraq war, trans

rights, and pro-Palestine protests in childhood. I carried signs to impeach Bush in 2006. I'd carry signs to impeach Trump today if it hadn't already happened twice without repercussion. How do we meet this moment of backsliding democracy/full-fledged fascism the likes of which 9-yr old me could never imagine we'd be fighting decades later?

We elect a passionate team of delegates to represent the interests of southern chapters & purple states! I seek your support because we need intersectional feminist voices at convention. Maybe someone who works in women's health at a time when threats to bodily autonomy & public health are at record highs? My priorities include repro rights, diversity & transparency within DSA, environmental justice, and funding community, not cops. Owen H (he/him)

I have been a member of ATLDSA since November of 2020. In that time I have participated in numerous electoral canvasses, set up a substantial number of electoral/labor benefit concerts, and have taken part in the rank and file organizing work for the labor committee. I have also set up multiple educational events as a part of the Poli Ed committee. I think that with fascism on the rise the DSA must be well organized and prepared to meet this threat. While I'm new to Atlanta DSA, I'm not new to working towards a world built on our common values. I grew up low income and taught for 3 years in Title I schools after graduating college. I loved teaching and building a tiny island of inclusion and solidarity in my conservative area, but ended up leaving because of my worsening disabilities. I have spent the last few years fighting disability and race discrimination at work and from the state, and want to join DSA efforts to do so. I have always been a joiner and one to ask for change from the inside. I already work on the chapter operations committee and have joined the national tech committee hoping to support moves to keep pushing DSA forward in efficiency and security. I am focused on making DSA more accessible, more inclusive, and more prepared for hard work ahead.

Jordon M (he/him)

Since November, many of us have wondered how we got into this age of Trumpism. And since then, I have been working as a member of DSA to untangle that very question. Outside the chapter, I work full-time as a Community Organizer with the Georgia Latino Alliance for Human Rights, empowering immigrant communities through our ICE-Free Zone (Know Your Rights) and ICE Chasers campaigns. I also promote our democratic socialist values under the Gold Dome as the Legislative Communications Intern for our chapter's elected Socialist in Office, State Representative Gabriel Sanchez. I organize with the Atlanta People's Campaign, the nonviolent direct action wing of the Stop Cop City movement born from the Referendum Campaign, where I helped lead canvasses and fundraisers that gathered over 116k petition signatures for a direct democracy style referendum on Cop City, and led several actions targeting City Council when they refused to accept them, including releasing hundreds of thousands of ping pong balls into the chamber. My background is deeply shaped by antifascist and abolitionist organizing, especially after being shot with rubber bullets by police during a BLM protest in 2020, permanently damaging my eyesight. On a national platform, I will represent ATL DSA by centering mass movement strategy, coalition work, and co-governance, building labor power, electing socialists like Gabriel Sanchez and Kelsea Bond, and boldly fighting the uniquely American fascism we face. We have nothing to lose but our chains, and a world to win.

Shannon Y (he/him)

We need a presence in the minds of the public. We also need a national organization for prospective candidates to grab onto. We can get both at the same time if we step into the void that both parties have left us: the Democrats and the Green party.
