

You have the right to...



REMAIN SILENT

- You are not required to answer questions from ICE/law enforcement.
- Do not sign any documents!



REFUSE A SEARCH

- Officers must have your consent or a judicial warrant signed by a judge to search you



LEAVE

- Ask: What legal reason am I being detained for? → ICE must list probable cause, a violation of the law, or have a judicial warrant
- Ask: Am I free to leave? → If yes, you may walk away

If you are detained, you have the right to...



AN ATTORNEY

- ICE does not provide a lawyer, but you may still ask for legal counsel



CONTACT YOUR FAMILY, EMBASSY, OR CONSULATE

- Diplomatic staff at embassies and consulates can help provide legal resources and contact family



HUMANE TREATMENT

- Access to food, water, the bathroom, and medical care

JUDICIAL WARRANTS are issued by a court, signed by a judge, and DO allow law enforcement to enter and search your house or non-public areas of a business.

ADMINISTRATIVE WARRANTS often come in the forms of arrest warrants or warrants for removal, are issued by immigration officials and NOT judges, and DO NOT permit ICE to enter or search your house.

ATLDSA

If you encounter ICE while you are...

ANYWHERE

- Stay calm and cooperate with orders. Do not physically resist, but do not help.
- Document badge numbers, names, date, and time
- Know contact information for your country's embassy/consulate

IN PUBLIC

- Record interactions
- Provide documentation if you are not a citizen; citizens do not have to provide documentation

IN A VEHICLE OR AT HOME

- You do not have to open the door
- Ask for a judicial (NOT administrative) warrant. ICE must confirm a correct name and address, and the warrant must be signed and dated by a judge.
- Have agents slide the warrant through your window/under your door.

AT A CHECKPOINT

- Provide your driver's license and documentation if necessary

When reporting an ICE encounter, remember S.A.L.U.T.E.

Size: How many?

Action: What are they doing?

Location: Where are they?

Where are they going?

Photos and videos are always helpful!

Uniform: What are they wearing?

Time

Equipment: What do they have on them?
